HIVES, FLIES, AND TEARING EYES



Hives, Flies, and Tearing Eyes: Dealing with the Miserable, Itchy Horse



Equine skin problems are some of the most frustrating conditions to diagnose and treat for both the horse owner and the veterinarian. Hives and hair loss are eye sores, and nobody enjoys seeing their horse in complete misery from the unending itching and scratching that can lead to self-mutilation. Diagnosing skin disease can be a real challenge, and many horse owners want a quick fix. An accurate diagnosis requires time, money and effort. In our climate, these summer months are the worst for many reasons. Here are some explanations and guidelines for heading down the road to an itch-free horse, along with some things to consider when discussing treatment options with your vet.

There are many types of diseases that affect horse skin. So the first step is to have the horse examined by your vet. Infectious diseases such as 'rainrot' (dermatophilosis) and ringworm tend to have good (read: easier, cheaper) diagnostic and treatment options compared with hypersensitivity (allergic) diseases that affect so many horses this time of year.

A significant problem for our horses right now is the disease known as *Culicoides* hypersensitivity. This is an allergic skin disease caused by a tiny midge (not the larger biting flies) that results in hair loss over the neck and chest, as well as itchiness and rub sores on the belly. Signs of this disease tend to be seasonal, becoming evident in the spring and lasting through the summer months. There is a new skin test being developed that shows promise in definitively diagnosing this condition. What can be done to treat the problem? Proper management steps are costly and time-consuming, but are probably worth the effort, as this allergy tends to be a problem year after year. Horses suspected of having *Culicoides* hypersensitivity should be stabled indoors at dusk and dawn, when *Culicoides* are most active. One approach is stabling from mid afternoon until mid-morning, allowing turn-out for 7-8 hours during the middle of the day. All open areas of the stall must be covered with a very fine screen mesh (regular house window screening is NOT fine enough to lock out *Culicoides*). Air should be moved with one or more large fans while the horse is in the stall to increase air circulation as much as possible. Human mosquito-repellant products containing DEET can be applied judiciously, but this should be kept to a minimum.

Fly control: Depending on your barn/stabling situation, fly control can be a major headache. The number-one management step is to get rid of the manure, which is important for many reasons other than fly control. Get the manure out and as far away as possible. Applying fly spray once or twice daily can help. At PCE, we have had good success with a fly spray called Endure (you can find it on our online pharmacy at www.pacificcrestequine.com). Beyond that, there are a host of options available from automatic sprayers to feed-through products and fly predators. You will have to explore the option(s) that will best fit your situation.

A word about fly sheets: They are probably effective at increasing the horse's comfort from bites from larger flies, but the mesh is not fine enough to protect an allergic horse from Culicoides. When deciding on a fly sheet, you need to consider the heat factor as well. My personal opinion is that the protection from flies is probably not worth it when you consider a horse standing outside in 110° in July. The horse can swat and bite to get flies away, but there's nothing they can do to get out from under that fly sheet to cool off. For some horses, fly sheets are going to be a necessary evil due to severity of disease. In those cases, consider the higher-end horsewear which will be more light-weight, and be sure to provide plenty of shade while the horse is wearing the sheets. A periodic cold bath can help increase comfort for those horses as well.

Steroids: the miracle cure for everything? Injections of corticosteroids (the most commonly used in horses are triamcinolone and methylprednisolone) are effective for providing relief from many allergic-type skin diseases. However, steroids do nothing to remove the actual source of the problem, so think of a steroid shot as more of a band-aid rather than a real cure. Now consider that there is a small risk of laminitis each time a steroid shot is given. If the horse is experiencing allergies every year, you will be giving a steroid shot every year, and eventually the effectiveness of the steroid shot will decline, requiring higher doses in subsequent years. Steroids still looking like the best option? This is why you should try management options first. Your veterinarian may also recommend oral steroid dosing and/or antihistamines. The effectiveness of these drugs varies in each case, so it is important to follow up with your veterinarian about the effectiveness of any medical treatment.

Allergy testing: A number of companies market allergy testing for horses. The typical scenario is that you send in a blood sample, they tell you what the horse is allergic to, then they send you a vial of a 'vaccine' to be administered to your horse on a weekly to monthly basis. The biggest thing to note here is that this type of testing and treatment has very little actual science to back up its effectiveness and safety. So proceed at your own risk. Some horse owners claim this option is very effective in cases where nothing else works. My feeling is that such an approach should be reserved for situations where proper management and/or good medical treatment have failed. The Culicoides testing mentioned earlier in this article is a SKIN test, NOT a blood test. Skin tests are commonly used in human and small animal medicine for effective identification of allergens, and I hope to see more skin allergen testing available as a practical diagnostic for horses in the future.

Your veterinarian should be your number one source of information and to diagnose your horse's skin problem. Depending on the clinical signs, other tests such as blood work and skin biopsy may be indicated. You and your veterinarian will need to be dedicated and work together to find the best treatment protocol. Your horse will thank you!

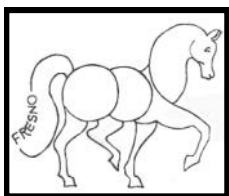
